Instructions:		
1. You might already have an idea of the lessons and skills home, or you can ask them about what they're learning	,	-

- home, or you can ask them about what they're learning in class. This will help make your thank-you more specific and meaningful.

 2. You could also use some of the following prompts to get started:
- a."I saw my child doing _____ the other day and it made me realize how
 - b. "When my child told me about _____, I could see them taking to heart the lessons you share in class."
 - c."I was so glad to hear my child mention _____. I loved that [book/topic] when I was in school, so it was fabulous to hear them excited about it too!"
- 3.It's recommended that you write the note by hand for a personal touch. If that's not possible, that's all right! Any way you can share your thanks is great. And if English isn't your first language or you are self-conscious about your writing, write what you can anyway. It's the thought and intention that counts, not grammar or spelling!
- 4. To end your thank-you note, it might be a good idea to let the recipient know that you don't expect a response. Many teachers and staff are overwhelmed, so a simple line like, "There's no need to respond to this thank you," can remove one more to-do from a teacher's list.
- 5. Send your thank-you to the teacher. You could ask your child to deliver this or mail it to the school directly. Parent-teacher conferences or after-school events may also be good opportunities to deliver your note.
